New Trials Manager

Work Package 1b

Dr. Jenny Wingham and her team have now successfully recruited 16 family members and carers of people with heart failure in Cornwall who have been interviewed about their experiences. All of those interviewed have talked openly about coping with the condition and have given a rich supply of information for analysis.

The next step will be further interviews in Birmingham and focus groups in Cornwall.

PPI Update

Nine PPI group members attended a meeting with Dr. Jenny Wingham and Dr. Colin Greaves on 24th April in Truro. All those in attendance gave some very valuable feedback on the physical activity DVD that may form part of the final intervention. The next PPI meeting will be on Wednesday 3rd July.

Intervention Development Group workshop

The REACH-HF Intervention Development workshop that took place in Birmingham on 23rd May was a well attended and successful event. The workshop provided an ideal opportunity for discussion and included a number of tasks and group activities based around some essential components of the HF manual:

- Managing medication
- Physical activity (including rehabilitation/establishing basic fitness and sustaining fitness/quality of life)

- Needs of caregivers

Work Package 1b

in Chronic Heart Failure Dr. Jenny Wingham and her team have now recruited 18 family members and carers of people with heart failure in Cornwall and Birmingham who have been interviewed about their experiences. Jenny is attempting to address the lack of ethnic diversity in the study and has worked with Prof. Sally Singh to obtain permissions for further interviews in Leicester. A caregiver needs analysis has been produced and focus groups are planned for the near future.

'Chronic Illness' Publication

Three members of the REACH-HF team (Dr. Jenny Wingham, Prof. Nicky Britten and Dr. Hayes Dalal) and Dr. Geoff Harding from the University of Exeter Medical School have written a qualitative synthesis of heart failure patients' attitudes, beliefs, expectations and experiences of self-management strategies, which we are delighted to announce has been accepted for publication in the journal 'Chronic Illness'.

Upcoming Conferences

Several members of the REACH-HF team will be attending the 20th annual British Association for Cardiovascular Prevention and Rehabilitation (BACPR) conference on 3rd and 4th October. Prof. Rod Taylor has submitted three systematic review abstracts for presentation at this conference. Jenny Wingham has also submitted an abstract for a poster presentation: 'Involving People and Carers

Living with an Unpredictable Condition in Research' based on work with heart failure patients and carers. Jenny will also represent the REACH-HF team at the PenCLAHRC PPI conference in Exeter in November.

New Trials Management •

Welcome to Chris Hayward and Vicky Eyre from PenCTU who began working as trials managers for REACH-HF on 1st August. The team will begin their work with protocol writing for WP2 and WP3.

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Work Package 1a Update

Intervention development is progressing well. We now have clearly defined ideas about what changes in self-management we should try to support for people with heart failure (targets for change). We are in the process of figuring out what the barriers to such changes are and how we can help people to overcome them. The three most important actions that we want to support are Physical Activity; Managing Medication; and Managing Stress and Breathlessness. Addressing these three elements will help to maximise health and ability to engage in enjoyable activities, thereby improving quality of life

Patient and Public Involvement Update

The last PPI meeting took place in Truro on 3rd July. The group, which consists of heart failure patients and their caregivers, gave some extremely useful information on coping with stress: how to achieve this, recognizing the barriers and how to overcome these. Possible alternative formats of the heart failure manual were also discussed, and the British Heart Foundation's 'Living with Heart Failure' guide was seen as a good example. The group's next task is to feed back on managing medications; this will be discussed at the next meeting on 4th September.

Work Package 1a Update

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We are approaching a critical point in our intervention development efforts. We are aiming to have a good version of the text for the whole manual by the end of December! This will then be sent to a printer for help with formatting and typesetting. We are also working on developing a training course for our intervention nurses. This is a crucial component of the intervention, as the nurse needs to engage the patient and caregiver, assess their current situation, give them hope and tailor information and activities to meet each individual patient's needs – we are not asking much! The intervention will stand or fall depending on the quality and skills of the nurses as well as on the quality of the written materials. We are also starting to plan the next stage of the study – a 'feasibility study' where we can test out the intervention in around 20 people with heart failure (our REACH-HF test pilots!) and get some feedback (from the patients, the nurse and the caregivers) about how the intervention is working for them and if we can do anything to improve it. So, it is a busy time for the intervention development team and we are looking forward to seeing the fruits of our efforts over the last year!

Conferences

Several members of the REACH-HF team attended the annual BACPR conference in Solihull on 3rd and 4th October. It was an informative event and Jenny Wingham presented a poster about involving heart failure patients and their caregivers in research and specifically in the REACH-HF project. This was in addition to three systematic reviews presented by Prof. Rod Taylor. Jenny more recently attended the PenCLAHRC PPI conference in Exeter and presented a poster based on her work with patients and caregivers.

Work Package 1b Update

WP1b is almost complete! 22 interviews in Cornwall, Birmingham and Leicester have taken place, in addition to a focus group in Cornwall to decide on order and priorities for the caregiver manual.

WP3 Update

The trials management team at PenCTU have been busy finalising the protocol for the feasibility study in WP3. The protocol and associated documents have now been submitted for ethical approval and will be considered at a Research Ethics Committee meeting in Berkshire on 17th December. The approvals will be in place ready for the feasibility study to begin in March 2014.

Cornwall commissioners have agreed to fund our intervention nurses and Peninsula Community Health (PCH) have kindly agreed to provide the nurses we need. The Excess Treatment Costs were agreed in 2 hours! The sponsor, Chris Cannaby, and the Peninsular Comprehensive Local Research Network lead Sarah Myers are working closely with the remaining centres.

Arrivals and Departures

A warm welcome to Jenny Elliott, who joins the Heart Manual Office team at NHS Lothian on 16th December. Jenny comes with a current wealth of both acute cardiac and rehab experience and is also a Heart Manual facilitator and a trainer. We look forward to her involvement in REACH-HF.

Dave Turner, qualitative research fellow at RCHT who conducted several of the caregiver interviews in WP1b, will be leaving at the end of the year. Thank you for your hard work and good luck for the future.

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Patient and Public Involvement Update

The last PPI meeting took place in Truro on 5th November. This was another productive evening and the group gave valuable feedback on the draft manual chapters 'Understanding Heart Failure', 'Managing Stress' and 'Managing Your Condition'. There was also a useful discussion on the monitoring components of the manual, format and how to encourage heart failure patients and carers to use the manual, based on the group's own experiences.

Feasibility Study Progress

All is progressing to plan for the feasibility study. We hope to begin recruiting patients (and their caregivers where they have one) in March ready to begin delivering the intervention in early April. We hope to recruit up to six patients per site (Truro, Abergavenny, Birmingham and York) giving a total of 24 patients to try out the intervention programme over the next six months. We will get feedback from patients, caregivers and facilitators about their experiences of using it. This will inform revisions to the manual and the training course and we will be ready to put "Version 2" into the main trial which will begin in November 2014.

Update on Ethics & other approvals

Full ethical approval for the feasibility study has now been obtained from Berkshire Research Ethics Committee.

We are now awaiting local R&D approval from the various study sites before recruitment can begin.

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Work Package 1a Update

Work Package 1a Update

After a year of hard work from the REACH-HF team, Heart Manual Office and patient representatives, the first intervention-ready version of the HF Manual was completed at the end of February (pictured below).

The manual is being tested in the feasibility study and has also been sent to several individuals and organisations for review, including the Cardiovascular Care Partnership, British Heart Foundation, Cardiomyopathy Association and Cardiovascular section of the British Geriatrics Society.

Programme Steering Committee Report

The last REACH-HF Programme Steering Committee (PSC) meeting took place in London on 27th March and the chairman Professor Martin Cowie and the rest of the committee were pleased with both study progress and strong PPI involvement.

The PSC will act as Trial Steering Committee and a separate Data Monitoring Committee (DMC) has been set up to monitor patient safety in the main trial. The first meeting of the DMC is to be held on 11th June.

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Feasibility Study Progress

We are delighted to announce that we have now finished recruitment for the feasibility study! 23 patients and 12 caregivers have been enrolled from across the four sites (Truro, York, Birmingham and Gwent). The aim of this study is to test feasibility and acceptability of the new HF Manual for patients, caregivers and facilitators.

Facilitators have begun to see patients and Colin Greaves, Anna Sansom and Jenny Wingham are analysing the audio recorded consultations.

The first 12 week clinic visits will take place in July... we look forward to seeing the results of the intervention!

Patient and Public Involvement Update

Another successful PPI meeting took place on 23rd April. The group was pleased to see evidence of their work in the final manuals.

The HF patients and carers who attended the meeting gave their views on the patient approach process and documents and suggested ways to maximise recruitment based on their own experiences. For example, the group thought it might be better not to mention the exercise programme at the initial approach stage as this would tend to attract the most physically active participants.

A separate study group is being set up to evaluate the impact of PPI in the REACH-HF study, which will involve interviews with the PPI group and some members of the research team. It is hoped that what we have learned can be applied to future research studies.

Upcoming tasks for the group will include commenting on the research process and methods, and reviewing the manuals after the feasibility study to make any revisions before the main trial.

Feasibility Study Update

The final 3 month clinic visits for patients and caregivers in the feasibility study are now being completed.

The results of the feasibility study will inform changes to the manuals and facilitator training before the main trial. The manual has been positively received by participants with a mean overall rating of the REACH programme of 2 (Very Good). Several participants stated the manual and facilitators have greatly improved their confidence in managing their condition and they are now feeling much more optimistic about the future.

A report of qualitative and quantitative findings from the feasibility study will be presented to the NIHR and Steering Committee at the next meeting in London on 25th September.

Caregiver Paper for Publication

Jenny Wingham, Nicky Britten and team have prepared a paper on WP1b (qualitative study of the needs of caregivers in heart failure management), which will be submitted for publication to a peer reviewed journal.

Facilitators and Research Nurses

We are delighted to announce that several of the facilitators from the feasibility study will be continuing their involvement into the main trial. Sarah Killackey, Sue Dean, Debbie Head, Kerry Andrews and Debbie Turpin - we look forward to working with you again!

Each study site will also be recruiting a research nurse in time for the outcome assessor training course on 1st December.

BACPR Conference

The annual British Association for Cardiovascular Prevention and Rehabilitation (BACPR) conference will take place in Londonderry on 2nd and 3rd October. As a team we will be presenting 3 posters: REACH-HF intervention development, the needs of caregivers and a Cochrane review by Rod Taylor.



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Preparation for Main Trial (WP3)

The main randomized controlled trial of the REACH-HF Manual will begin in January 2015. The principal investigators at each site have prepared a recruitment strategy.

The Peninsula Clinical Trials Unit (PenCTU) have been working with the research team to prepare the protocol for WP3 and this will be submitted for ethical and R&D approval very soon.

The University of Dundee are keen to be involved with WP2, the pilot trial of the REACH-HF Manual in heart failure with normal ejection fraction (HF-NEF) patients, and are working with the local CCG to approve excess treatment costs.

Patient and Public Involvement

The PPI group have been busy reviewing the patient-facing documents for the main trial and have given some very helpful feedback. They have been told about the results of the feasibility study and modifications to the manual and have the opportunity to give their own views.

Several members of the group have also kindly agreed to be interviewed about their experiences of being part of the REACH-HF PPI group as part of a sub-study on the impact of PPI.

The group was given a report of findings from the feasibility study and had a very useful discussion on the manual and how it has been/should be facilitated. Jenny Wingham also asked the group to contribute to the topic guide for caregivers who will be interviewed in the main trial.

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Main Trial Update (WP3)


New Version of the REACH-HF Manual

Main Trial (WP3) Update

Now that all necessary approvals are in place at the four study sites (Truro, Gwent, Birmingham and York), we are pleased to say the main trial is underway.

Truro was the first site to enrol a patient on the 19th of January. The first three patients in Truro have been randomised and anyone receiving the intervention has been assigned to a facilitator.

We have a target of 6 patients per month until November 2015 to be recruited from each site via a number of pathways including GP surgeries, hospital clinics and community heart failure services. The target is to recruit 216 patients in total.

Message from Dr. Hayes Dalal, Co-Chief Investigator: "I want to thank you all for your hard work in getting us to this stage, and for the efforts now needed to recruit HF patients and their caregivers to our study"

Patient and Public Involvement

The last PPI meeting took place in Truro on 11th February. Jenny Wingham and Colin Greaves updated the group on progress in the trial so far. Those present at the meeting gave some helpful feedback on the patient-facing documents for WP2. All PPI members have received a copy of Version 2 of the Heart Failure Manual and are pleased with its format and content.

Thank you to all those (both PPI members and the research team) who took part in the study of the impact of PPI in REACH-HF that was led by Jo Palmer at the Royal Cornwall Hospital. Jo will be producing a report of the findings from data gathered from interviews and questionnaires.

The PPI group will remain involved in the study throughout the trial and the next formal meeting will take place towards the end of the year.

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REACH-HFpEF (WP2) Update

The Ethics application for the pilot study of the new Heart Failure Manual in patients with heart failure with preserved ejection fraction (HF-pEF) is almost ready for submission. The team in Dundee are hoping to begin recruitment in April.

As part of this study, the WP2 team are also putting in a bid for funding for a sub-study using Echo testing during exercise to assess the impact of the REACH intervention on physiological function of the heart in this group of patients.

Recruitment to the REACH-HF trial is now well underway in Truro, Gwent, Birmingham and York—a big THANK YOU to the principal investigators and research nurses who are making the project a success so far.

The recruitment target is 6 patients per month per site (plus carers where they have one) to recruit the 216 patients in total by the end of November. So far 78 patients have completed baseline visits.

Thank you also to the facilitators who are working with patients allocated to the intervention group (i.e. those receiving the Heart Failure Manual) and helping them to manage their condition and make positive changes to their lifestyle. Early indications from facilitator contact sheets are very encouraging.

Although the next PPI meeting is not until November, the group's continued involvement is still essential to the study. Dr. Hayes Dalal (Co-Chief Investigator) has written the following message of thanks:



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Main Trial (WP3) Update

179 patients and 81 caregivers have been recruited in the main trial so far. We're not far off the total target of 216 patients but recruitment will be extended to the end of January 2016 for Birmingham and the end of March for Gwent to allow these sites to reach the final numbers.

Publications

A paper describing the intervention and its development is in submission to the journal 'BMC Pilot and Feasibility Studies'. The intervention was strongly influenced by service users, heart failure specialists and other experts with experience in supporting people with heart failure, as well as the latest evidence and clinical guidance. Now we wait with baited breath to see if the intervention works in practice!

We are pleased to say that the protocol paper for the main trial has been accepted for publication in BMJ Open.

Congratulations also to Hayes Dalal, Patrick Doherty and Rod Taylor on publication of their clinical review on cardiac rehab in the BMJ.



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REACH-HFpEF (WP2) Update

Recruitment to the pilot trial of the REACH-HF Manual in patients with Heart Failure with preserved Ejection Fraction (HF-pEF) is continuing to progress in Dundee. So far 29 patients (of the total target of 50) and 15 caregivers have been randomized. An amendment to the protocol is currently being processed to allow recruitment of patients from some new pathways including the heart failure nursing service.

Patients will also have a resting Echo scan before and after receiving the REACH-HF intervention to look at any effects on physiological function of the heart.

Main Trial (WP3) Update

The follow-ups are still progressing well in Truro, Birmingham, Gwent and York. Research teams at all the sites are doing a fantastic job of encouraging patients (and their caregivers) to continue to the end of the trial—of the 216 patients recruited, there have been 16 withdrawals so far. All follow-ups are really important to us. 51 patients have reached 12 month follow-up and completed the study to date.

The process evaluation team are busy working on fidelity checking of facilitator consultations and interviewing patients and caregivers to research their individual experiences of the REACH-HF programme. The interviews take place at 4 months (the end of the intervention period) and again at 12 months to find out whether the REACH-HF Manual has been effective at helping to maintain a healthy lifestyle in the longer term

Publications and Presentations

Recent outputs by the REACH-HF team have included an editorial on telehealth in cardiac rehab published in 'Heart', and presentations at the National NHS Research & Development Forum (Stratford-upon-Avon) and the European Society of Cardiology Heart Failure Conference (Florence, Italy) - see www.exeter.ac.uk/news/research/title 513896 en.html.

Future REACH-HF publications will include the intervention development paper (led by Colin Greaves) and the protocol paper for WP2 (led by Vicky Eyre from PenCTU) - watch this space!

Since it was published in September last year, the BMJ clinical review on cardiac rehabilitation by Hayes Dalal, Patrick Doherty and Rod Taylor (available at http://www.bmj.com/content/351/bmj.h5000) has been accessed more than 21,000 times!

The associated podcast has been downloaded 5,500 times and the patient podcast recorded by Kevin Paul has been listened to 4,200 times—impressive!



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REACH-HFpEF (WP2) Update

WELL DONE to Karen Smith, Chim Lang and the team in Dundee who have now randomised 40 patients with Heart Failure with Preserved Ejection Fraction (HFpEF) to the pilot trial of the REACH-HF Manual. Despite this being a difficult group to recruit, several more baseline clinics have been scheduled in June and we're keeping our fingers crossed that the target of 50 patients will be reached!

Patient and Public Involvement

The last PPI meeting (chaired by Kevin Paul) took place on 23rd March. We now have some new members! The group were updated on the study and were pleased with how the trials are progressing. It was agreed that more frequent meetings will be useful towards the end of the main trial (Spring 2017) as results become available. Study extension to June 2018

REACH HF has secured approval from the NIHR for a 6 month extension to the research and £50,000 in additional funds. The extension was supported by Professor Cowie, the chair of the programme steering committee who wrote to the NIHR stating that the REACH-HF team had made "excellent progress to date" and a short extension was necessary to ensure timely delivery of the scientific outputs of the various work packages.

The study extension will allow Dr Hayes Dalal to co-ordinate the writing of the study monograph and includes funds to pay for open access publication on the findings of the research.

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REACH-HFpEF (WP2) Update

At the end of December 50 patients had been recruited with 45 of them returning the primary outcome measure (retention of 90%). All the data has now been collected and sent to Fiona Warren (statistician) in Exeter for analysis. The results will be discussed at the Programme Management Meeting (PMG) in April.

REACH-HFpEF (WP3) Update

The main trial recruited 216 patients at all four sites have now completed their 12 month follow ups with 86% retention (186 patients). All qualitative interviews are completed and Julia in Exeter has started coding data: specifically looking at the difference between 4 and 12 month interviews and what sustains or prevents continued behaviour change. Also looking at interactions between patient and caregiver and how REACH HF has impacted on the relationship. We are expecting to present results of WP3 at the PMG in September 2017.

Patient and Public Involvement

In September the PPI group (chaired by Kevin) reviewed the REACH-HF progress report and the reasons why participants 'dropped out' of the study were discussed. Looking forward the group discussed proposed caregiver research that would build on the work done in the REACH-HF programme. Jenny has applied for a NIHR career development fellowship to fund this work.

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REACH-HFEF (WP3) 'Best of the Best'

Following on from last September's Programme Management Group meeting when we had the 'big reveal' of the REACH HFrEF multicentre RCT results, Rod and Hayes have been busy submitting abstracts to several conferences. We are pleased that our abstract was in the top 3 in the heart failure category and was judged the 'Best of the Best' by the British Cardiovascular Society. We will be making an oral and poster presentation at their annual meeting on 6th June. A full manuscript of the findings has also been submitted for publication.

WP2 accepted by BMJ Open

The results of WP2 have been presented at the 2017 BACPR (London), AHA (California), the BSH (London) meetings and in 2018 at the BJGP (London) & the SW SAPC (Plymouth) conferences. BMJ Open have now accepted the REACH HFPEF pilot RCT for publication.

The PPI group enjoyed a Christmas meal at the County Arms, Truro to celebrate their contribution to the project. Rod and Hayes discussed the results of WP3 with the group and how the group may like to be involved in the next stage of the research.


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Conference Season!

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Beacon Site Competition



We are delighted that the Beacon Site competition launched on the 4th of October as part of the enhanced dissemination of REACH HF. The team are looking for 4 cardiac rehabilitation sites in the UK to start delivering the updated REACH HF programme to their patients with heart failure. This competition is part of the phased roll-out plan which allows the team to showcase the intervention. The 4 Beacon Sites will also help provide valuable insights into organisational or logistical barriers to the future implementation of REACH HF and potential solutions for dealing with these.

The Beacon Sites will receive free materials for 50 patients, facilitator training for up to 3 health professionals, and ongoing support.

In return, the team ask for the sites to be research ready to allow ongoing evaluation (which will be compared with the main trial findings) and further innovations.

Patient & Public Involvement

The PPI group have continued to actively be involved with the project and Kevin Paul continues as Chair. They have been working with Sam van Beurden and Colin Greaves to update the patient facing materials and to discuss ongoing support needs and the potential of digital platforms. They're valuable feedback has resulted in a user-friendly Progress Tracker and an increased emphasis on preparing patients to continue self-management and keeping active after nurse facilitation comes to an end.

Beacon Site project

We are delighted to announce that we have had much interest from various sites across the UK in delivering REACH HF on the ground. Applications to our Beacon Site competition announced last year were strong and showed a real enthusiasm for home-based rehabilitation for people living with Heart Failure.

Following interviews held with shortlisted sites earlier this year, we have now identified the four NHS trusts to be our "beacon" sites. This staged roll-out of REACH-HF will help answer whether the benefits to quality of life seen in the trial also apply to real-world healthcare settings.



It will also mean that we can learn more from these diverse sites about how the offer and delivery of REACH HF might work in the real-world and that the programme can be refined, monitored and evaluated before it is extended further.

The successful sites from the competition are: University College Hospitals London NHS Foundation Trust, Belfast Health and Social Care Trust, Gloucestershire Care Services, and Wirral Community NHS Foundation Trust. They were chosen for their geographical spread, commitment to offering home based care and having systems of providing high quality data for the National Audit of Cardiac Rehabilitation.

The training course for the facilitators has been refined by Colin Greaves, Samantha van Beurden, Jennifer Wingham, Patrick Doherty, and NHS Lothian, to address the training needs identified following the multisite trial. Each of the Beacon Sites will be sending 3 staff members to Edinburgh for the 3-day training course in May delivered by NHS Lothian.

Dissemination

We are delighted that the cost-effectiveness results were published in the *European Journal of Preventive Cardiology* and REACH HF was mentioned again on BBC Spotlight Breakfast on the 2nd of April after a press release by the University of Exeter: https://bit.ly/2XtxyJb

The Beacon Site project and selected sites were presented (SvB) in an oral slot at the South West Primary Care conference in March in Southampton and oral slot at the British Journal of General Practice conference on the 29th of March (HD). REACH HF also featured in several PhD presentations at the Post Graduate Centre at RCHT in January.

People

Earlier this year, Sinead McDonagh and Jeff Lambert joined Samantha van Beurden in Exeter and are working on the next steps of REACH HF. In Birmingham, Paulina Daw started her PhD with Colin Greaves in January and will be working closely with the REACH HF Beacon Sites. In February, Fiona Giles has taken over from Emma Thompson as our manager at NIHR and is liaising with the Journals Library to ensure publication of our Programme Monograph—sometime this year.

What are the next steps?

Given the successful outcomes of REACH HF in terms of clinical effectiveness and long term cost-effectiveness we are looking at ways of implementing it in the NHS.

We are also considering the logistics of digitizing aspects of the intervention and talking to researchers in Denmark about a possible REACH HF like trial in Denmark. We are in the process of making funding applications to realise these next steps in the roll out of REACH HF.

Beacon Sites launched

Four cardiac rehab teams (from University College Hospitals London NHS Foundation Trust, Belfast Health and Social Care Trust, Gloucestershire Care Services and Wirral Community NHS Foundation Trust) who were successful in the Beacon Site competition and selected to be the first sites to roll out the REACH-HF home based cardiac rehab programme, attended a facilitator training event in May which was run by NHS Lothian at the Heart Manual Department, Edinburgh.

Following an introduction by Professor Rod Taylor, the REACH-HF facilitator training was delivered by Dr Carolyn Deighan (Psychology), Miriam Noonan



(Family & Friends), Professor Patrick Doherty (Physical Activity) and Edith Sheerin (Nursing aspects). In addition, PhD student, Paulina Daw, delivered a presentation on service evaluation. Professor Colin Greaves, Dr Sinead McDonagh and Dr Hayes Dalal attended as observers with Louise Taylor as their host. The four Beacon Sites are now actively recruiting heart failure patients to participate in the REACH-HF programme. Further facilitator training dates are available later in the year (25th-27th September).

Dissemination

We are delighted to announce that the mixed methods process evaluation of REACH-HF has been accepted for publication in BMJ Open (in press). In addition, 'Caregiver outcomes of the REACH-HF multicentre randomized controlled trial of home-based rehabilitation for heart failure with reduced ejection' was published in the European Journal of Cardiovascular Nursing (https://doi.org/10.1177/1474515119850011). Two letters related to REACH-HF have recently been published in the European Journal of Preventive Cardiology 'Home-based rehabilitation for heart failure: we need to act now' (https:// doi.org/10.1177/2047487319836515) and 'Heart failure rehabilitation improves quality of life'(https://doi.org/10.1177/2047487319863507). Our most recent publication is 'Exercise-Based Rehabilitation for Heart Failure: Cochrane Systematic Review, Meta-Analysis, and Trial Sequential Analysis' (https:// doi.org/10.1016/j.jchf.2019.04.023) with a supportive editorial in JACC HF (https://doi.org/10.1016/j.jchf.2019.05.006). Prof Taylor also spoke on REACH -HF at the June 2019 British Cardiovascular Society conference. REACH-HF has recently been selected by the South West Academic Health Science Network (SW AHSN) as an innovation that could be suitable for national spread. A decision on the outcome is awaited.

PPI

We are now in the second half of 2019 and there hasn't been a group meeting for some time. However, as you will see from this newsletter there has still been a great deal of activity with submissions to various medical publications, further applications for funding and progressing the Beacon Sites roll-out of REACH-HF. I read through all documentation with my PPI hat on and am in regular contact with Hayes and Sinead, making sure that the PPI team remains an important part of the REACH-HF project. Hope to see you all soon and enjoy the rest of the summer, Kevin.

What are the next steps?

Given that REACH-HF has shown both healthcare and economic benefits, we have made grant applications, which, if successful, will aid in the wider implementation of home based cardiac rehab across the NHS. We have been invited to submit a stage 2 application to the NIHR Health Services & Delivery Research (HS&DR) programme. We would like to make a digital version of the REACH-HF intervention and are looking at ways to fund this initiative. We are also exploring international collaborations with researchers in Denmark and Australia. Watch this space!
